Thank you all so much for the incredibly warm welcome back. It has been truly lovely to ease back into school life and to feel so supported by both parents and children – your kind words and encouragement have meant a great deal.

This week has once again been packed full of exciting learning and enriching extra-curricular activities! Reception shared their wonderful postcards with me – I was so impressed with the quality of their handwriting and the thoughtful explanations they gave. It's lovely to see such enthusiasm in their early writing. Year 1 have been busy creating non-chronological reports as part of their science work on Mary Anning. They also explored where dinosaurs once lived and even had time to consolidate their learning on money. What a productive week!

Year 2 had a fantastic adventure to the Cotswold Water Park. The children described the trip as "so cool" – high praise indeed! Mrs White reported that they represented the school brilliantly throughout the day.

Year 3 had the opportunity to visit Shottery Girls' Grammar School, where they used the library and took part in reading activities alongside older students. This was a fantastic way to nurture a love of reading, build confidence, and help prepare the children for future transitions.

Year 4 have been learning all about different shapes and angles. Sienna told me, "We've been learning about right angles and that there are different types of triangles!" The children also went swimming this week – a vital life skill and a highlight for many. Year 4 also shared some of their learning about burial cities as part of their Egyptian topic.

I was lucky enough to attend Aston Villa last week with children from Years 3, 4, and 5. As always, their behaviour was exemplary, and we just missed a place in the final. The children were still so proud of their achievements – and rightly so! Miss P also shared that we came 1st in the Fitt4Kids competition, and that Years 5 and 6 placed 3rd in the Pentathlon event for KS2. A huge well done to all involved! Year 5 have also been designing their own Greek meals and learning to compare the Dark and Archaic Greek periods – a great combination of creativity and history. Some of our Year 6 pupils took part in transition days last week as they begin preparations for their move to secondary school. It has a PEGI 3 rating and falls under the massive multiplayer battle royale genre of games, meaning there are things like chat, in-game spending, friends lists and more. It's important that games like this are set up correctly in accordance with the age of the child playing. For example over 13's have default access to party chat groups.

A round up of school life

On Wednesday, Year 3 visited the library at Stratford Girls' Grammar School for an engaging reading session led by sixth form students. The sixth formers, who regularly visit Stratford Primary every Wednesday to read with the children, orchestrated a series of activities designed to spark a deeper interest in reading. The session began with an interactive storytelling exercise centred on the legend of Romulus and Remus. The children were tasked with sequencing the events of the story, enhancing their comprehension and narrative skills. Following this, they channelled their creativity into designing Roman shields, linking the mythological tale to historical artefacts. The session concluded with a whimsical story about a curious creature from space that transformed into a cat upon arriving on Earth, captivating the children's imaginations. The children thoroughly enjoyed the session, which successfully combined historical education with creative expression, fostering enthusiasm for reading and storytelling.


