Reception = $93.8\% \downarrow \text{Year One} = 96.7\% \downarrow$



Talking to children about Race and Racism – SHOW RACISM THE RED CARD


If you want to chat to a child or young person about racism, you might be worrying about how to start the conversation. You might worry about saying the wrong thing. Or you might want to shield your child from difficult issues.

Children may have seen images or stories in the news about race and racism. Some children might not fully understand the stories and may have questions. It's important to encourage positive and open conversations about race and racism with young people.

- Have conversations about this often, not just when it is in the news
- Keep the conversation going and let children know it is ok to ask questions
- Encourage children to understand the lived experience of ethnically minoritised groups better

Music to try at home

10 in the Bed



Instructions:

- · line up 10 toys
- · sing the song 10 in the bed
- · each time 'one rolls out', act this out with the toys

Try singing the song and acting out the lyrics yourself.



Think of ways to change the song to include whole body movements that you can act out e.g:

- We were jumping in the bed....
- We were skipping on the bed...



Jar Xylophone



What you need:

- some glass jars
- water
- 2 x spoons

Instructions:

- Fill each jar with a different amount of water. You could use food colouring so that you can see the levels clearly.
- Tap gently on the jars with a spoon. Notice how the amount of liquid effects the pitch of the note produced.
- Explore different jars. Does the size of the jar affect the note produced?

Build your instrument:

- · Arrange your jars into a line in front of you.
- · Play the jars individually.
- Explore playing two jars together using two spoons, one in each hand.

Listen:

Listen to the sounds produced in 'Fossils' from 'Carnival of the Animals' by Saint Saens.

Think about creating your own 'Fossil' music using your jar xylophone. Record your music and share it with someone else.



Try some STEM activities (Science, Technology, Engineering, Maths)



Turn milk into plastic - chemical reaction

Ingredients: Milk, white vinegar

Heat a cup of milk until it is steaming. Add 4 teaspoons of white vinegar to a mug. Add the milk to the mug with the vinegar in it. The milk should form clumps. Mix slowly with a spoon. Stack four layers of paper towels on a hard surface. Once the mixture in the mug has cooled a bit, use a spoon to scoop out the curds. You don't want the liquid. Fold the paper towels over the curds and press down to absorb excess liquid. Knead the curds together into a ball of dough. This is the casein plastic. You can add colour at this point too and mould into shapes. Leave to dry for 48 hours on the towels until it is hard.

COULD you design a new medal for the

Shakespeare Marathon and Half-Marathon 2026?

Each year the event organisers, RunThrough, and supporters turn to the children of Stratford to dream up a design that can be used to create the medals that are hung around the necks of thousands of runners who finish the race.

Previous designs have included the Royal Shakespeare Theatre, swans on the River Avon, the Bard and colourful scenes from around the town.

But it's really up to you to come up with your own image.

Andy Veale, editor of the Stratford Herald which organises the medal competition along with Stratford Rotary Club, said: "We look forward to seeing your colourful and creative designs. The competition, which is sponsored by law firm Shakespeare Martineau, is open to children of all ages who live in the Stratford district or attend a school in the district.

"A panel of judges will pick the winner, who, as well as seeing their design turned into a medal, will receive a copy of the medal as a keepsake and £50 of vouchers."

The medal will be about 70-90mm in diameter and does not need to be round - the shape can vary as necessary - and can include up to eight colours.

The theme should reflect the town of Stratford, the marathon or Shakespeare. The race name - the Shakespeare Marathon and Half-Marathon - will need to be included in the design along with the Rotary logo and RunThrough logo.

RunThrough Events, which is organising after taking over from Stratford Rotary Club, will get the design made into medals.

Last year's design, pictured, was by Aria Kaminska, who at the time was a Year 4 student at Alveston Primary School. Previous competitions have been won by a mixture of primary and secondary school students and sixth-formers.
