MESSAGE FROM THE DESK OF Mrs Humphriss

As I write this message I am reflecting back on a couple of wonderful two days with Year 4. Mrs Archer, Mrs McCormack, Mrs Fade and myself spent 2 days in York with the children. We pack a lot into those days. We always warn the children there will be a lot of walking and we definitely get our steps in. We set off at 8am on Thursday and made good time up to York arriving at lunchtime and enjoyed sitting in the sunshine whilst we ate our packed lunch. Then it was backpacks on and we set off along the river walk into the city. It was stunning scenery and glorious weather. Once we get to the city walls we set off on a spy trail around the streets of York. This is an opportunity for the children to really immerse themselves in the history of a city which has been in existence since the Romans in 71AD. On our spy trail we look for different things such as; the rose window on the minster, a bible hung above a shop, a star above a former inn, the birthplace of Guy Fawkes, gargoyles, the shortest street 'Whip ma Whop ma gate' and more. We then head back along the river, enjoying an ice cream to keep us going and arrive at the youth hostel to check in and enjoy tea before Mrs McCormack introduces us to a Viking drive (similar to a Beetle drive but drawing a Viking ship) and Mrs Fade leads a quiz before bedtime. The next day after breakfast and packing our cases we set off again along the river and head to the Jorvik centre to find out how Vikings lived and look at the archaeology which was discovered. By the time we have completed this it is lunchtime which we enjoy in the gardens of The DIG centre. Then it is a route march back again to the youth hostel to retrieve our suitcases and get back on the coach and a 3 hour journey back to school. We also took George and Desmond on our trip and they had an amazing time with different people, even getting to sleep in a bunkbed and have their photo with the Vikings! Residentials such as this one build children's resilience, provide them with an opportunity to reinforce their learning from the classroom and get to know different places in our great country.

Children Dealing with Loneliness - NSPCC

Loneliness is a difficult feeling for anyone, so it's not surprising that children can really struggle when they feel lonely. By learning more about loneliness, you can work with your child to combat it. The Campaign to End Loneliness defines this feeling as: 'a subjective, unwelcome feeling of lack or loss of companionship. It happens when there is a mismatch between the quantity and quality of the social relationships that we have, and those that we want'. While loneliness can be caused by being physically alone, being alone doesn't necessarily lead to feeling lonely. Sometimes children can feel lonely even if they're often with other people. They might be feeling this way if they don't feel properly seen or understood. Loneliness can look and feel different for everyone, but if you're worried about a child in your care, it's good to talk to them about what they might be feeling and experiencing.
