## SEND NEWS

WHAT is SEND?

SEND stands for Special Educational Need and/or a Disability

Someone has SEND if they:

- Have a learning difficulty which makes learning harder e.g. ADHD or dyslexia
- Have a disability, e.g. physical disability and neurological conditions like autism

You do not need a diagnosis to receive special educational provision.

If you think your child has SEND or you're worried about their progress:

- speak to their teacher or the Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCo)
- you can also speak to your GP

The first point of contact is always your child's school. Ms Parton is our SENCo.

The school is best placed to access support and help from outside agencies, such as Educational Psychologist, Occupational Therapy for example.

A GP can also help by recognising if there is a mental health or neurodevelopment issue.

Talking to the right people helps.

We have also enjoyed a walk around town for Shakespeare week, a carbon monoxide workshop and learning playground songs through a singing playgrounds workshop.

Another action-packed half term it's been in Year 3! The classroom has been buzzing with creativity, curiosity and confidence as the children threw themselves into a fantastic range of learning experiences across the curriculum. We stepped into the world of theatre by writing our very own playscripts, learning how to bring characters and dialogue to life on the page. We then put our persuasive powers to the test by creating eye-catching advertising posters, carefully choosing words and images to hook our audience.

Our imaginations truly soared during narrative writing, where the children composed the back story to Razvani, the great fire fiend from our class text, Firework Maker's Daughter. Maths saw us getting to grips with fractions, developing our understanding of equal parts, the whole, numerators and denominators. We then moved on to mass and capacity. Things got dramatic as we studied the powerful forces of nature - earthquakes, volcanoes and tsunamis. The children were fascinated by these natural phenomena and learned how they shape our planet in awe-inspiring ways, relating their knowledge to current events around the world.

In RE, our focus was on the period of Lent and Easter. To enhance our learning, we visited Holy Trinity Church. The children brought the Palm Parade to life with a joyful re-enactment and deepened their understanding of Lent's meaning and importance in the Christian calendar. Our DT lessons were a whirlwind of imagination and engineering as we explored cam mechanisms and created our very own automaton toys. The children's creativity shone through as they designed moving models with cleverly concealed mechanisms.

Science sparked plenty of wonder and excitement as we delved into the topic of light and shadows, discovering how light travels and how shadows are formed and experimenting with different materials to investigate transparency and opacity. And, of course, the grand finale... our spectacular Year 3/4 performance of Peter Pan! The enthusiasm, talent and teamwork made it an unforgettable performance! The children dazzled with their acting, singing and dancing – a magical end to an amazing half term! Well done, Year 3!

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#### 11th April 2025

This Spring term in Year 4 has been full of exciting learning and memorable experiences. They made their own moving space buggies by building wooden frames and using electrical circuits to ensure their buggy could move forwards and backwards. They had a fantastic day cheering the players on by chanting 'Cho', meeting some of the players, getting to play against a robot, having time to play table tennis and using the speed machine to find out how quickly they can hit a ball.
