

Year 1's Autumn Learning Journey

The children have thrown themselves into Year 1 with energy, curiosity and growing confidence, making excellent progress across the whole autumn term. They quickly settled into new routines and expectations, developing independence while building strong foundations in reading, writing and maths. In English, learning came alive through high-quality texts and immersive experiences: hunting for a lost teddy, retelling *Owl Babies* through drama, exploring traditional tales such as *Hansel and Gretel* and *Goldilocks*, and writing for real purposes, including letters, poems and alternative story endings. A particular highlight was following and writing instructions to design, make and evaluate their own gingerbread people, combining literacy with practical skills in a memorable way. Phonics teaching progressed confidently from Phase 3 into Phase 5, enabling children to read and write longer words and utilise an increasingly secure vocabulary of tricky words. In maths, pupils deepened their understanding of number through hands-on exploration of place value, number bonds, addition and subtraction, building fluency and confidence. Beyond the classroom, children investigated the natural world through outdoor science, compared life in the past and present, experimented with colour, form and materials in art and DT, and developed teamwork, coordination and resilience in PE. The term ended on a high note with a fabulous Christmas performance and festive celebrations, where the children proudly showcased their hard work, creativity, and growing confidence as Year 1 learners.

Year 2 have had a busy half term! During our Crazy Creatures topic, we have learned all about brilliant nocturnal animals with different super powers that make them perfect for their habitats - from bioluminescent angler fish in the deep, dark oceans to British owls in our barns and woodlands! We have written fascinating fact files that you can read for yourselves in our school library! This term has been packed with exciting learning and memorable experiences for Year Three. In history, the children explored Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age bringing their learning to life with a fantastic visit to Stonehenge. The children deepened their understanding through creative writing, producing Stone Age inspired stories and clear instructional texts explaining how to make a flint axe, as well as designing and making their own Bell Beaker pottery. A BFG workshop at the Royal Shakespeare Company inspired drama and imagination, while cooking tacos developed practical life skills. Outdoor learning was enjoyed during our visit to the Heart of England Forest, and festive fun came from watching *Ready Steady Colour's Christmas Feast*. Have a well deserved Christmas Year Three!

We have had a fabulous half term in Year 4. We began with a wonderful trip to the Heart of England Forest, where we learnt all about the Anglo-Saxons and how they invaded Britain. The children became archaeologists for the day where they played an invasion game, took part in pottery making, built Saxon village models and even tried their hand at weaving.

Back in school, we spent the rest of the first half term learning in more depth about Anglo-Saxon life: how they lived, the fascinating excavation of Sutton Hoo, how Angle-land was ruled, their conversion to Christianity, and the story of Alfred the Great. In Science, we carried out some exciting investigations too, including creating a model of the digestive system to show how poo is made, and exploring what different liquids do to the enamel on our teeth by soaking eggs in vinegar, orange juice, milk, coke and energy drinks.

We have also loved diving into our Vikings topic in Autumn 2. The children explored how Vikings lived, including their homes, daily life and beliefs. They were intrigued by the attack on Lindisfarne, learning why it was such a significant moment in history. We also discovered how Vikings dyed their clothes using natural materials and spent time examining Viking runes and their meanings. In STEM lessons, the class particularly enjoyed designing and making their own Viking longships and experimenting with Viking horns to investigate how sound works.

A special highlight this term was the incredible opportunity to sing with the Armonico Consort at Coventry Cathedral. The children worked hard learning the songs and performed beautifully in such an inspiring and historic setting.

It has been a busy and brilliant half term, and we are excited to continue our learning journey as we move into the Spring term in January. Happy Christmas Mrs Archer, Mrs Beesley and Ms Davies.



What a fabulous term! Year 5 have been extremely busy this term. One of the most exciting things of the term was when the children came in one day to find their classroom totally destroyed! They had to work as detectives using their retrieval and inference clues to work out what could have happened and who (or what) did it. They have now reported this by writing a newspaper article linked to this event. The children have also been finishing learning about the Shang dynasty, forces and have also focused on life cycles and human development in Biology. They then linked this scientific knowledge to their STEM lessons where they investigated patterns between growth, engineered a moving arm showing how it works and designed their own invention that would help people in different stages of the human life cycle. They have been getting creative when learning how to use tints, tones and shades to develop their drawings. As well as participating in many sporting events - winning first in a hockey tournament, first in a south Warwickshire dodgeball tournament and third in the county dodgeball tournament.

They have worked so hard and really deserve a fantastic break. I wish you all a Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! Looking forward to seeing you all in 2026!



What a fantastically productive term! Year 6 have really risen to the challenge of being 'top of the school' and have made a super start in their position as Stratford Primary leaders and role models. This has been commented on by so many of our prospective reception parents, who have been toured around the school so well by all of the year 6 guides. In our learning this term, we have been scientists and geographers, travelling the world, following in the footsteps of Charles Darwin, and also have loved immersing ourselves in the history of WWI and WWII, during our Britain at War topic. Our thoughtful and emotive trench diaries and poems, inspired by Wilfred Owen, will transport you back to the battlefields of The Great War and our beautiful wet felt poppies are a fitting tribute to the soldiers we have been researching, who lived in our local streets, and even attended our school, and who sadly lost their lives during WWI. We have finished off the theme with our 'Make Do and Mend' challenges, learning all about the campaign itself and how to join materials using running stitch, whip stitch and blanket stitch in our DT lessons. We then used this to make our beautiful bookmarks - complete with handsewn buttons and mini handmade pompoms - and our recycled bunting to hang for our End of War celebrations. One of the highlights of Year 6 so far has to be meeting our new Reception buddies, getting to know them and, of course, proudly watching them perform in their Nativity play. We are all looking forward to January when our class will be entering the realm of the Frozen Kingdom. Until then - a huge 'Merry Christmas and Happy New Year' from all in Year 6!
